#### **South Sioux City Fall Cleanup**

It's City Fall Cleanup time! South Sioux City Fall Cleanup week is <u>October 7<sup>th</sup>-11<sup>th</sup> 2024!</u>

#### Tree debris pickup will be Oct. 14<sup>th</sup>-18<sup>th</sup> 2024!

Please wait to set out tree debris until this week.

Pick up for each week will be ON your normal trash pick-up day. Please set out items at the end of your driveway or in the parking area only *the night before* your normal trash pickup day. The parking area is the grassy area between the curb and the sidewalk. Residents are asked to please park in their driveway on pickup day and <u>don't park</u> in front of the debris. This will aid in the safety and efficiency for the cleanup crews.

**NO** *glass, paint, liquids, tires or trash amount over 1 pick-up load* will be allowed. Notice will be given to customers for the items listed or with more than a pickup truck load. It will then be the resident's responsibility to remove *remaining* garbage or tree debris. Garbage clean up is *only* in the fall.

Tree debris included for pick up must be *less than* 4' long, not over 4" in diameter and can *only* be tied together with *string or twine*. **NO rope or wire!** No more than 1 pick-up load allowed. Residents will be given notice if over 1 pick-up load etc. it will be their responsibility to remove remaining debris. Tree pick up is *only* in the fall.

Crews only make one pass for the clean-up each week, if items are set out after that pass it is the resident's responsibility to remove.

If you have questions please call **Gill Hauling Inc. 402-404-3035**We ask for resident patience during the week of Fall Cleanup. This is a great program for the city, but safety to the workers is number one!

#### National Crime Prevention Month

Since 1984, October has become an official month of recognizing and celebrating the practice of crime prevention. The National Crime Prevention Council has a goal to promote crime prevention through trainings, technical assistance, and publications. This article will emphasize Personal Awareness to help prevent crime or becoming a victim of crime.

Social Media: Technology is used in our everyday lives. People are moving to a new area or trying to expand their social circle, online socializing sites offer the perfect platform - Unfortunately, some people use these websites with ill intent. Consider taking the following personal safety precautions with these social media safety tips.

- Make privacy a habit by doing a regular social media privacy check-up.
- Turn off geolocation.
- Report harassment or inappropriate content.
- Pause before you post: Content that contains personal information or your whereabouts could pose a safety risk.

Stay Safe While Driving: Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among teens. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute, 80 percent of auto accidents involve some form of distracted driving.

- Don't text and drive.
- Don't drive when you're upset or angry.
- Don't adjust the car's controls while you're driving.
- Create an emergency kit.

Parties and Bars: Alcohol is the most commonly used and abused drug among youth and is responsible for 4,700 deaths annually in underage youths.

- Don't drink and drive.
- Don't leave a party or bar alone.
- Look out for your friends.
- Make arrangements for someone to pick you up.

#### National Bullying Prevention Awareness Month

Bullying, by definition, is unwanted, aggressive behavior often among school aged children, but can be attributed to all ages. There is often a real or perceived power of imbalance. Power imbalances can change over time, so the bully can become the victim and vise versa. The behavior is often repeated over time. Bullying prevention is important because there can be lasting consequences for both the victim and the bully.

#### Prevention:

- Talk about strategies for staying safe, such as staying near adults or groups of other kids.
- Talk about how to stand up to kids who bully. Give tips, like saying "stop" directly and confidently. Talk about what to do if those actions don't work, like walking away.
- Encourage the child to report bullying if it happens.
- Check in with kids often. Listen to them. Know their friends, ask about school, and understand their concerns.

#### Common Mistakes:

- Don't ignore it. Don't think kids can work it out without adult help.
- Don't make the kids involved apologize or patch up relations on the spot.
- Don't talk to the kids involved together, only separately.
- Never tell the child to ignore the bullying.
- Do not blame the child for being bullied

According to pacer.org, school-based bullying prevention programs decrease bullying by up to 25%. Educating our school staff by training them on what bullying is, what the school's policies and rules are, and how to enforce the rules on students will create a safe environment for them. If your child is a victim of bulling make sure to get their input, talk to the school authorities, teach your child to avoid the bully, encourage your child to be assertive, and deal with the bully in a pro-social manner. Contact your local school officials first and your local authorities if needed.

### Special Session Update: LB 34

SEPTEMBER 6, 2024 (LINCOLN, NEB.) — The Nebraska Department of Revenue (DOR) is providing information on property tax relief changes resulting from a new credit through the passage of LB 34 (2024). The bill frontloads the credit of 30% of school district taxes paid automatically by reducing property tax statements instead of requiring the taxpayer to claim it as a refundable income tax credit. The total amount of the frontloaded relief is \$750 million that will reduce 2024 property tax statements. This credit is set to increase by a minimum of 3% each year and as the state's economy grows, LB 34 includes a provision to direct even more funding to property tax relief.

Previously under LB 1107 (2020), approximately 45% of Nebraskans were not claiming the property tax credit when filing their income tax returns. Now, through LB 34, those taxpayers will experience upwards of 20% in direct property tax relief. For those taxpayers who previously claimed those tax credits, LB 34 will continue to provide property tax relief, without the burden of filing a claim. Taxpayers will now receive the benefit much earlier in the process. The new frontloaded credit will appear on each taxpayer's 2024 property tax statement, which will be mailed in December 2024.

The frontloading of this credit only applies to school district taxes, so there is no change to the community college tax credit, which must still be claimed by taxpayers on their income tax return. This credit does still provide a 100% refund of community college taxes paid by the taxpayer.
